Special Message from your Fire Chief – Jason Van der Veen Please VOTE!



It’s nearly here – the primary election is RIGHT around the corner! Elections matter. We are fortunate to live where citizens govern themselves. But that comes with an awesome responsibility: voting. Please vote on or before August 3 if you haven’t already!

An important measure on the ballot is **Prop. 2021-3, the Fire Levy Lid Lift**. Your NWFR Board unanimously placed this measure on the ballot so voters can decide if they want to provide funds to maintain and enhance current levels of fire and emergency medical service. NWFR has not asked its voters for a levy rate increase in 12 years.

Providing our community with reliable emergency response services is our highest priority and I believe it’s also a top priority for our community. But delivering these critical services at our current standard is becoming more difficult. **Population growth is increasing service demand every year**, with our calls for service rising approximately 52 percent since 2011. And **state law caps total property tax receipts** collected by local governments to 1% more each year plus the value of new construction. Even with careful budget management and firefighters foregoing salary increases in recent years, **our current service levels cannot be maintained without additional revenues.**

Prop. 2021-3 would maintain and enhance services levels and improve response reliability by:
Adding four battalion chiefs—battalion chiefs are working, supervisory firefighters (not administrative positions) who are on shift with their crews, 24/7. Their additional training and experience ensures they can manage safe, quick and effective responses to complex emergency service calls.

Adding four firefighters to staff a peak transport unit—to meet the significant increase in service calls, especially during peak times when NWFR is receiving multiple calls in both populated and rural areas.

Replacing aging fire engines, a ladder truck, water tenders and firefighter equipment—most of our vehicles—critical for 911 response—have exceeded their planned useful lives.

An important question, of course, is **what will this cost?** If Prop 2021-3 is approved, NWFR’s levy will be raised from \$1.15 per \$1,000 assessed value in 2021, to \$1.45 beginning in 2022. That increase would cost the owner of a home with an assessed value of \$400,000 an additional \$10.13 per month in 2022 for these public safety services. A homeowner with an assessed value of \$600,000 would pay \$15.20 more per month in 2022.

NWFR is committed to providing quality fire and EMS services. But current services levels cannot be maintained, and replacement of aging vehicles is not possible, with revenues currently available to us. Only the voters can decide if they want to increase funds to meet existing needs.

We are not alone. To address similar financial challenges, several of our neighboring fire districts are also seeking voter approval of levy lid lifts on the August 3 election. If Prop. 2021-3 fails, NWFR will assess why voters rejected the measure and is planning to go back to voters on the November 2021 ballot.

My entire focus is to build your fire district to be administratively lean and efficient, while putting maximum resources into the services—fire and emergency medical response—that we are here to provide to our citizens.
