NWFR Appoints Deputy Fire Marshal

I am a fifth-generation Whatcom County resident. My great-great-grandparents settled on Dakota Creek in the late 1800s. The property that I reside on has been passed down from generation to generation and I feel very fortunate to still live on a piece of my family’s homestead.

I attended kindergarten through twelfth grade at Custer

Elementary, Vista Middle School, and Ferndale High School. At the age of fifteen during the school year, I worked at Mount Baker Lanes and spent many weekends competing in bowling tournaments. A large portion of my summers was spent working for local farmers bucking hay, collecting it from the fields, and stack up to 32,000 bales into barns and sheds.

Ten days after graduation, I found myself in basic training at Fort Dix New Jersey. After ten long weeks of having a very tall man wearing a brimmed brown hat yelling at me and telling me that everything I did wasn’t good enough, I received my first promotion, graduating top of

I spent a couple of years in the U.S. Army and upon returning home in 1989, I joined the Plumbers and Pipefitters Union Local 40 and signed up to be a volunteer firefighter with Fire District 13. Realizing how much more I loved the fire service than plumbing, I began testing for full-time positions up and down the

Regional Fire Authority

What is a Regional Fire Authority and why should I know about this?

North Whatcom Fire and Rescue (NWFR) and Whatcom County Fire District #4 (WCFD4) are exploring the potential of creating a Regional Fire Authority (RFA) to include both districts. An RFA is a special purpose district established by voters in a service area that provides funding for fire and emergency medical services. State law provides the framework for cities, towns, and/or fire districts and their voters to form an RFA as a way to gain service efficiencies through consolidation while retaining local control.

NWFR and WCFD4 have been operationally merged by contract for ten years. Creating an RFA will take this integration to the next level as a single unified agency. This will enable full consolidation of the two separate fire agencies and provide opportunities for efficiencies in delivery of fire and emergency services, protecting current service levels and response times.

First, participating agencies must agree on a plan for the RFA; that is the mission of the Planning Committee. The plan is due in April and is on schedule. The proposed plan must then be approved by the Boards of Commissioners of NWFR and WCFD4. If both Boards approve, then the commissioners would call for an election on the proposal. All voters in the pro-

posed service area would be eligible to vote on the proposition. The Planning Committee will set a firm election date if both fire commissions agree to move forward and place the measure on the August ballot.

If the RFA is approved by voters, firefighters and other staff from both NWFR and WCFD4 will become employees of the RFA. Similarly, the fire stations, fire trucks and other emergency response vehicles will become the responsibility of the RFA.

Forming the RFA would eliminate current WCFD4 fire and EMS levies and the NWFR fire levy, and replace them with a single RFA levy. This levy would be the same rate paid throughout the entire RFA. The RFA levy amount has not yet determined as it must be voter approved.

To encourage input into the RFA process, the Planning Committee will conduct public meetings to answer questions and get comments.

The first opportunities are Thursday, February 18 at 3:00 pm and Tuesday, February 23 at 7:00 pm via Zoom.
