Recreational Burning Information

Outdoor fire safety

- Move the grill away from siding, decking, and other things that can catch fire.
- Stay with the grill the entire time you're cooking.
- Build campfires at least 25 feet away from walls, shrubs, or other things that burn.
- Use a metal screen over wood-burning fires to keep sparks from floating out.
- Have a charged garden hose or two buckets of water nearby.
- Turn off or put out fires before you leave the backyard or campsite.

Wildfire safety

- Create a safety zone of up to 100 feet around your home. Remove pine needles and dry leaves from around your home and keep woodpiles at least 30 feet from your home.
- Know your community's local evacuation plan. Plan ahead by practicing two ways out of your neighborhood. You should know the evacuation route and plan a place where you will go.
- If you are told to evacuate, do so immediately. If you wait until the last minute, the roads may have heavy traffic. Blowing embers and debris from the fire may make it hard to see.
- Stay informed. Listen to the TV/radio broadcasts for current weather and emergency instructions. Sign up to receive local emergency alerts and warnings on both your home phone and cellphone.
- Make sure everyone in your family knows your meeting place ahead of time. Let your family and friends who do not live in your area know your meeting place.
- Keep your car fueled and keep an emergency supply kit in your car. Back your car into the garage or park it in an open space facing the direction of escape.


Recreational Burning cont.

General Fire Rules

- All fires must be attended by 16 year old or older
- Can only burn natural vegetation grown on that property
- No burn barrels allowed anywhere at any time
- No burning at any commercial business
- No burning of household garbage
- No burning of paper or cardboard (except to get fire started)
- No burning when winds exceed 7 miles per hour
- No construction debris / milled lumber of any kind
- Must have landowner permission to light all fires

NWFR Withdraws from RFA Press Release

April 19, 2021

Board of Fire Commissioners of Whatcom County Fire Protection District No. 21 (“District 21”) Announces Withdrawal From the Regional Fire Protection Service Authority Planning Committee with Whatcom County Fire District No. 4 (“District 4”)

(Lynden, WA)-The District 21 Fire Commission has announced that they have ended the joint effort to form a Regional Fire Authority (RFA) with District 4. Pursuant to statute, the withdrawal becomes effective 30 days after notification, but no Planning Committee meetings are scheduled during the 30 days.

Commissioner Bruce Ansell said, “Although we plan to continue exploring regionalization opportunities for the benefit of our citizens, District 4 is not the right partner for us at this time”.

In an open public meeting on April 15, 2021, the commission unanimously approved withdrawing from the RFA process. They noted that the decision was very difficult, especially because District 4 has terminated the Inter-Local Agreement for District 21 to provide fire and emergency medical services to District 4 residents and businesses. However, District 21’s commissioners agreed that there are cultural and strategic differences between the two fire commissions that made moving forward with an RFA inadvisable.

District 21 will continue to provide fire and emergency medical services in District 4 through December 31, 2021. District 21 will work collaboratively with District 4 during the transition period, and has invited District 4 to submit recommendations for a new Inter-Local Agreement to ensure that District 4 continues to receive high quality fire and emergency medical services.

Commissioner Ansell stated, “Our commission thanks all of our dedicated staff members who worked to support the planning committee. We are deeply disappointed, but must always keep at the forefront of our work our taxpayers and employees and what is best for them. We are committed to providing excellent service to our taxpayers, and we are committed to the employees who provide that service”.

Each district will be separately communicating with their residents about future plans.
