BERT: Neighbors Supporting Neighbors Until Help Arrives

During everyday emergencies, our fire district's crews respond quickly and professionally — and our community depends on and trusts that expertise. But in a major disaster, such as a severe storm/flooding, earthquake, or tsunami events, emergency resources must focus first on the most urgent, life-threatening needs. This is where the **Blaine Emergency Response Team (BERT)** can play a helpful, community-level role for those neighborhoods impacted but waiting for pro-

BERT is a volunteer-led, neighborhood-based effort designed to help residents stay informed, connected, and safe while waiting for professional responders during large-scale events. The group does **not** replace fire, EMS, or law enforcement. Instead, BERT supports the overall response by gathering basic situational information from neighborhoods — such as blocked roads, vulnerable residents needing medical attention, or areas without communication — and relaying that

information when emergency agencies are able to receive and act on it.

Who Makes Up BERT?

BERT volunteers come from a wide range of backgrounds, bringing valuable skills that strengthen community readiness. The team includes:

- Retired and active firefighters and EMS personnel who understand incident priorities and responder safety

- Medical professionals with experience in patient assessment and community health
- Radio specialists and licensed amateur radio operators who can maintain communication when normal systems fail
- Trained, certified, and registered Whatcom County CERT members who follow standardized, FEMA-based practices
- Contractors and tradespeople who assisted during recent flood emergencies and understand local infrastructure challenges

Community volunteers who want to help with logistics, documentation, wellness checks, and who are trained to conduct document neighborhood damage assessments.

This diverse mix ensures that BERT remains grounded in safe practices, respects the role of professional responders, and focuses on tasks appropriate for trained volunteers.

A Supportive Role During Major Incidents

When call volumes surge or access is limited, early neighborhood-level information can help professional first responders build a clearer picture of conditions across Blaine and Birch Bay. BERT volunteers stay within safe, simple tasks: checking on neighbors, sharing accurate information, and documenting what they see — never entering hazardous areas or attempting hazardous rescue operations.

By strengthening neighborhood readiness and improving communication during major incidents, BERT complements the

work of our first responders with a goal of providing them key information on the status of our community while it waits for professional help. It's one more way neighbors can support one another — and support the professionals who serve us every day.





Types of Calls



False Alarms = 24
